I have had a truly extraordinary experience serving as the advisor for the Delta Alpha Pi Honor Society this year.

The mission of DAPi is to celebrate academic distinction and to champion the rights of students with disabilities. The students in DAPi set themselves apart by successfully pursuing academic excellence, maintaining at least a 3.1 grade point average, in the

midst of identifying as someone with a disability.

Recently, DAPi students released a publication called "Breaking Barriers" in which they share writings and other artistic mediums that express their personal journeys in overcoming the challenges of having a disability. #### Weekly Check-ins by Kaitlyn Rogers

"North Shore Community College (NSCC) is a diverse, caring, inclusive community that inspires our students to become engaged citizens ..... maximizing our students' ability to learn and achieve academic, personal, and professional success through appropriate support and services." This NSCC value statement is, at its core. what Accessibility Services strives to

accomplish. One of the ways we work to achieve this is through weekly check-ins.

Weekly check-ins, one-onone meetings with a disability counselor, are individualized to meet the specific needs of the student. Some students come to weekly check-ins to get strategies for organization, time management and studying while others come for help with the transition from high school to college.

We create a safe place for

students to ask questions and feel emotionally supported; where students can be themselves and know they will be held accountable for their education. We encourage the students to self-advocacy and connection to resources both on and off campus.

Weekly check-ins give students the knowledge that someone is in their corner. All students with accommodations may request weekly check-ins with one of our disability counselors and can contact us to set up an appointment.

### What is Universal Design for Learning (UDL)? By Lucy Bayard

UDL is a research based framework and proactive approach to developing course design which removes barriers to learning by addressing students diverse learning needs.

Faculty across departments have shared best practices on how to integrate UDL in curricula design and teaching practices. Here is one example of UDL in practice:

Barbara Heath is the Program Coordinator for the Environmental Horticulture Program and serves as a member of the college's green team. Here is what she has to say about UDL:

"I give students choices as to how to approach certain assignments. For example, I might post a news podcast, a video and a textbook reading all pertaining to this week's class and ask the students to read or view one of the three prior to our discussion. I find that often the students will do more than one when presented with multiple ways to access material. I create a "Digging Deeper" page for major themes and topics covered in my classes. These pages become a repository for articles, links, movies, and other online resources that we just didn't have time to explore in class. It is labor intensive at first, but it becomes second nature once you see the payoff in student success. Accessibility Services and the Center for Teaching, Learning, and Innovation are all great resources to help."
